COVID-19: Temporary crisis or turning point for social security?

The COVID-19 has significantly changed the context for social security in the Americas region. Social security measures have been at the centre of strategies to mitigate the health, social and economic impact of the crisis, and were made possible by rapid and agile responses by social security institutions.

The lessons learnt bring opportunities to enhance social security coverage and service delivery in the future. However, addressing long-term challenges including changes in the world of work, inequalities and demographic ageing may become both more urgent and complex after the pandemic. Responding to the broad concern about the long-term impact of the crisis, the session will address the following key question:

What is the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on our long-term objective to build comprehensive and well-administered social security systems in the region?

Coverage extension: Building on crisis responses and seizing new opportunities

The COVID-19 crisis has once again demonstrated the essential role of broad social security coverage for individuals, societies and economic resilience. As an emergency response, governments across the region rapidly extended current schemes and created new one-off or regular benefits to cover vulnerable population groups. The implementation of these measures often required the development of innovative administrative approaches to provide access and deliver benefits to these up till then uncovered households.

These experiences and innovations can now provide important opportunities to enhance longer-term efforts towards the goal of extending coverage to the informal sector and to vulnerable groups of the population. In this context, the session aims to look forward and answer the following question:

What are the lessons learnt from delivering crisis response measures that could support the region's efforts to extend coverage in the future?

Access, adequacy and the gender gap: Enhancing social security's role in addressing inequalities

Inequalities have been a long-term challenge in the Americas, and social security has greatly contributed to addressing this challenge. Despite many social security measures ,the social and economic impact of COVID-19 has widened the gap, and brought to the forefront a broad range of inequalities and related vulnerabilities. As social security strategies to reduce inequalities have to be recalibrated in this context, they will also need to take into account new sources of inequalities related to labour market changes, new care needs and digital literacy.

The session will analyse the evolving patterns of inequalities in the region, with a specific focus on gender inequalities, and aims to answer the following question:

How can social security systems better contribute to addressing evolving inequalities, close the gender gap and ensure equal access to benefits and services?

COVID-19 and ICT: An accelerating paradigm shift in social security service delivery
